Thursday, August 4, 2011

After a short five mile drive from the hotel we arrived at our first destination—the Kalamazoo Air Museum, which was voted “best place to spend a day with your family” and “best place to take out of towners” (us) by the *Kalamazoo Gazette* and, after seeing/experiencing things first hand, it is easy to see why. Not only did we enjoy superb tour hosts who walked us through the various displays while relaying real-life stories connected with the aircraft, we were not disappointed after asking them detailed questions about what we were shown and receiving knowledgeable answers. Other highlights included a 4-D theatre experience called Missions, their amusement park-style rides, and seeing the Lockheed SR-71B Blackbird. Our hats off to the staff at the Air Zoo and we thank them for a great morning.

Another “short country drive north of Kalamazoo” and we arrived at our luncheon/afternoon tour destination—the Gilmore Car Museum in Hickory Corners, Michigan. The meticulously maintained grounds sports an antique Shell Station and, more importantly (at least at lunch time), a 50s-era diner from which we enjoyed a great lunch. Once fed, GIATers could enjoy the awesome Gilmore collection which features over 200 classic cars, 528 hood ornaments, vintage travel trailers, and even a children’s antique pedal car collection. Two particular noteworthy automobiles were a 57’ Chevy

with incredibly low miles and one of the lowest mileage Deussenbergs in existence. I can attest to their immaculate condition having crawled underneath each to make a personal inspection against such claims. I was not disappointed.

Lest we forget the fairer sex, an optional Ladies Tea was hosted at the nearby Kellogg Mansion to round out the afternoon and end Wednesday’s official tour activities.

Friday, August 5, 2011

The day dawned bright and beautiful and after a short drive we assembled at the Frederick Meijer Gardens in Grand Rapids, Michigan. A great facility, Meijer Gardens features 132 acres of displays including a carnivorous plant house, arid desert garden, seasonal display greenhouse, English perennial and bulb garden, Victorian garden, woodland shade garden, and an internationally renowned sculpture

collection. Hopping a tram, visitors are treated to a driver-narrated tour of the sculpture garden offering a fascinating insight into what motivated the artist and their work. Suffice it to say, Meijer Gardens & Sculpture Park offered may a photo opportunity. After a fine morning of sight, sounds and smells (flowers) we were treated to a delicious lunch in the Meijer conference rooms.

Upon leaving we were introduced to what is famously known as a “Michigan left” which means turning right from the parking lot and doing a u-turn at the marked cross-median connectors farther down the road. I have to admit, even

The museum offers an in-depth look at Gerald Ford's rise from a humble youth to Eagle Scout, star football player, World War II naval officer, U.S. congressman and how he became the nation's vice president and chief executive officer without being elected. Most notably, the museum brings the Ford presidency in the mid-1970s to life with artifacts, documents, photography and video displays. It is truly an educational experience that reflects the singular presidency of our nation's 38th chief executive Gerald R. Ford.

After another great day we assembled back at the Best Western Hospitality Inn for a brief meeting for next year's tour followed by the traditional bluegrass concert courtesy of our own musically talented GIAT members.

Saturday, August 6, 2011

The morning's first destination was the St. Julian Winery in Paw Paw, Michigan, the oldest and most awarded winery in the state. Founded in 1921, it is still family owned and operated. The friendly staff divided us into

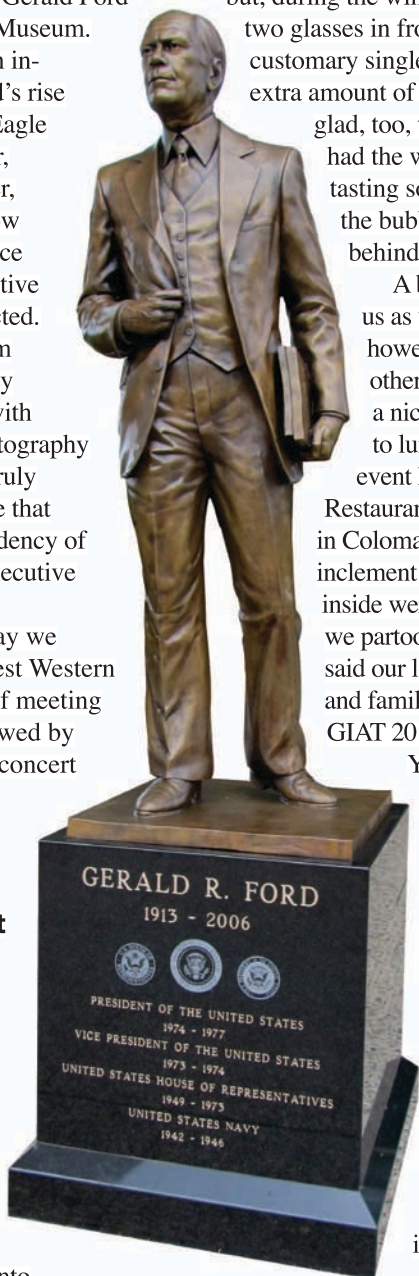
